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Q & A with a CPA

Q: I plan on applying for an extension for my taxes – what does that mean and what do I need to do?

A: If you are not able to file your federal individual income tax return by the due date, you may be able to get an automatic 6-month extension of time to file. To do so, you must file IRS Form 4868 by the due date for filing your calendar year return (usually April 15).

There are three ways you can request an automatic extension of time to file a U.S. individual income tax return:

First, you can electronically file Form 4868. If you file your Form 4868 electronically, you will receive an acknowledgement or confirmation number for your records and you do not need to mail in Form 4868. If you need to pay additional taxes when filing Form 4868 electronically, you may do so through the outside service provider or through e-file. If you wish to file electronically, be sure to have a copy of last year's tax return. You will be asked to provide the adjusted gross income (AGI) from the return for taxpayer verification.

A second way of requesting an automatic extension of time to file your individual income tax return is to pay part or your entire estimated income tax due by credit card or debit card or by using EFTPS. This is a program through the IRS. You may pay by phone or Internet through one of the service providers listed on Form 4868. Each service provider will charge a convenience fee based on the amount of the tax payment. At the completion of the transaction, you will receive a confirmation number for your records.

Finally, you can request an automatic extension of time to file your individual income tax return by completing paper Form 4868 and mailing it to the appropriate address provided on the form.

Please be aware that an extension of time to file your return does not grant you any extension of time to pay your tax liability.


Special rules may apply if you are:

- living outside the United States
- out of the country when your 6-month extension expires, or
- Serving in a combat zone or a qualified hazardous duty area.

Similar rules apply to state income taxes. For New Jersey residents, be sure that you pay the entire tax by April 15th. If you don't, the State of New Jersey will treat the return as late and the extension request invalid.

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HOME IMPROVEMENT matters



In our past articles, we've talked about planning and budgeting a home addition project. Now we are going to look at what you can expect when the actual construction begins. For the sake of conversation, let's look at an addition that includes expanding your kitchen with a basement beneath and extra bedroom space above.

Your General Contractor (or GC) will handle submitting the permit request for you, which typically takes three weeks or so to get through your town's building department. Once you have that, the first actual construct step will be prepping the site. Since the addition includes a basement, we need to dig the hole. Anything in the way (a deck or patio, for example) will need to

be removed. Also, your GC will need to account for any pipes or wiring coming into that wall of the foundation. This could include water supply lines or the home's main sewer line. Since our addition is on the back of the house, we need to be able to get the big earth moving machinery into the back yard. Sometimes this requires taking down a fence or creating some kind of ramp or even a temporary gravel road if the ground is soft. There are many different ways, but a good GC will make every effort to protect the property as these heavy machines make their way into your back yard.

So where does the dirt go and how big the will the hole be?

Dirt is cheap, but moving it around in big trucks can be costly. In some cases, your excavator (the folks doing the digging) may be able to spread it around somewhere on your property. Otherwise, most of the dirt will have to be trucked away at an added cost. Some of it remains as back fill. More on that in a movement.

When the hole is dug, it's actually going to be a bit bigger than the basement. Your GC will need some room to work, so figure it's going to be about three feet further out in each direction. This allows room to work on the foundation.

The foundation is your basement, so let's talk about that for a minute. Foundations come in three basic formats. Modular/pre-cast, which are still rare and often used with modular homes. These are concrete panels that are made in a factory and then they are bolted together. Block Walls are made up of concrete block. Many people remember "cinder" blocks but those are no long used. Concrete blocks look similar, but are sturdier and made of concrete. They are stagger-stacked like bricks to create the basement walls and skimmed with concrete to create a smooth surface. A Poured Foundation is all concrete. Wood forms are set up with steel reinforcement rods and concrete is poured into the form and allowed to harden.

Each foundation type has some pros and cons. Modular foundations are still kind of new and some folks would like see how

well the seams hold out ground water over 30-40 years. A block wall is typically a good choice in residential construction, but is labor intensive. A poured foundation is solid concrete and good for areas where water might be a problem, but can look sort of rough and industrial since you may see seams where the forms met during the concrete pour. Best when the foundation will be buried and that won't be seen.

Which brings us to that extra dirt, the back fill, we saved a few paragraphs above. When the basement walls are done, we still have that extra three feet all away around to deal with. In most cases, a "foundation drain" will be installed so that rainwater in

the soil around the basement will find its way into the drain and away from the foundation. The "back fill" dirt is used to cover that up and fill in around the basement walls.

So, we now have our basement. The actual basement floor may be poured later and our back lawn is now mostly dirt, but we are ready for the next step, which is framing our new 2-story addition!

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Serves 4 (or 8 side dishes)

Ingredients:

- 4 medium Sweet potatoes, halved lengthwise
- 1 bunch broccoli rabe, tough stems trimmed, remaining parts chopped
- 2 shallots finely sliced
- 2 garlic cloves, chopped
- ½ lb. Italian turkey sausage, I went sweet, but spicy is fine too!
- Extra virgin olive oil (EVOO)
- ½ tsp. paprika
- ½ tsp. sea salt
- ½ cup shredded Gruyere cheese (or cheese of choice)

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper, brush open sides of potatoes with olive oil, lay potatoes face down on parchment paper and bake for 30 minutes or until inside is soft.
- Bring to boil a saucepan half full of water and a dash of sea salt. Add broccoli rabe and blanch for 3-4 minutes. Remove and rinse in a strainer under cold water. Set aside.
- In the same saucepan, add 1 tablespoon EVOO, brown the sausage over med-high heat, breaking into pieces with a wooden spoon. After 5 minutes, add shallots and broccoli rabe, stirring occasionally until well combined. Then add garlic, paprika and salt and mix well. Remove from heat while you prepare the potatoes.
- Using a fork, carefully fluff the center of the sweet potato creating a well for the filling. Pile on the sausage and broccoli rabe. Top with desired amount of cheese, and add back in the oven for a few minutes until cheese is melted.

Tax Time

Tax Time!

Doesn't it feel like we just rang in 2015? Yet, here we are! Taxes due April 15.

Since it's now March, hopefully you've sent your tax preparer your W-2s; 1099s; itemized expenses; and deductible expenditures.

However, have you ensured that you made the maximum contributions possible to your retirement accounts before filing taxes? There's still time!!!

Here's an overview of the types of accounts you can still contribute to, and the maximum allowable contribution . . . as long



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as contributions are made before filing taxes or April 15 . . . whichever comes first!

2014 Maximum Limits for Qualified Retirement Plans and IRAs (accounts you can contribute to, and have those contributions applied to 2014):

- SEP Plan Participant Maximum = Either 25% of Compensation or \$52,000, whichever is lower. For those self-employed, the maximum percentage of compensation is 20%. [SEP Minimum Compensation eligibility is \$550.]
- SIMPLE IRA Employee Contribution = \$12,000 [For those age 50 and older, \$2,500 can be contributed additionally as a "catch-up" contribution.]
- Traditional or Roth IRA Contribution = \$5,500 [For those age 50 and older, \$1,000 can be contributed additionally as a "catch-up" contribution.]

Remember . . . \$5,500 is the total contribution for both the Traditional IRA AND a Roth IRA combined (if contributing to both).

o Phase-Out Range for Deductible Contributions to Traditional IRA for 2014

[If your income was more, you CAN make a contribution to a Traditional IRA, however, that contribution is not tax-deductible.]

- Married Filing Jointly: \$96,000-\$116,000
- Single/Head of Household: \$60,000-\$70,000
- Married Filing Separately: \$0-\$10,000

o Phase-Out Range for Contributions to Roth IRAs for 2014 [If your income was more, you cannot make a contribution to a Roth IRA.]

- Married Filing Jointly: \$181,000-\$191,000
- Single/Head of Household: \$114,000-\$129,000
- Married Filing Separately: \$0-\$10,000

Some values increased slightly for contributions for the 2015 tax year. So, planning ahead, be sure to confirm the limits for 2015.



The above is for contributions to be applied for 2014 prior to filing taxes.

The key is to plan ahead for 2015 so that you can smooth these contributions out on a monthly basis making it easier to save.

Remember, your accountant and/or tax preparer is your best source for personal tax questions/situations.

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




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RUNNING 4 Answers

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

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


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
